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New Erasmus+ program for the period 2021–2027 has just been established by the European Commission, with more than 26 billion Euros attributed to this cycle. Some program priorities remain the same (such as the use of digital technologies in education), while others find their way into Erasmus for the first time (i.e., environmental issues and transition to "green schools"). This presentation focuses on two Erasmus KA2 projects in the field of innovation: "Virtual Reality for Language Learning" and "Next Generation Placement Tests". Both projects aim to develop innovative digital tools to enhance the language learning experience for both students and teachers and are carried out transnationally with partners from Serbia, Croatia, Bulgaria, Romania, Italy, and Spain.

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I will showcase materials I created for English Language programs in which I apply Content-Based Instruction (CBI) methods of pre-teaching of vocabulary and Think-Pair-Share for Reading/Listening/Speaking activities. The participants will be offered suggestions on how to reshape their teaching style by scaffolding and paying attention to Ss' affective filter, cognitive load, and Zone of Proximal Development (ZPD). Although there is a difference between ESL/EFL and CBI, some aspects of teaching methodology are applicable in both teaching contexts: we can arouse our Ss' curiosity by being more 'readable' and in line with their interests.

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Speaking may be the most burning issue when it comes to learning a foreign language. How can we make shy students speak? How can we enhance speaking in our classrooms? How can we involve students more, so that they can become confident users of the language? During it, the participants will get ideas, practice, learn and share, by discovering and by getting actively involved in all the activities I will demonstrate, which they can use in their classrooms to enable much more language practice for their students.

By using a three-step coaching technique, we will get to know two ways to cope with bad stress. In our communities, we teachers are perceived as leaders. In this workshop, the presenters, two experienced online teacher educators, outline challenges typically faced by teachers in online professional development courses. They include (a) preparedness factors (different levels of background pedagogical knowledge and skills); (b) program factors (the mismatch between expectations of participating teachers and course facilitators), and (c) contextual factors (time management, balancing work, and course participation). The presenter will share with the audience some of the strategies they successfully implemented in the OPEN Program courses to overcome these impediments. Attendees of this session come away with techniques to differentiate and customize online support response to teachers' needs.

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Most educators agree that 21<sup>st</sup> century skills are essential to students' success in academic and professional life, and many institutions state a commitment to helping students develop skills such as creativity, collaboration, communication, and critical thinking. However, one obstacle to truly integrating learning experiences that help students develop these skills is assessment. Putting a number on the extent to which a learner has grown in terms of intangible qualities such as creativity is a particular challenge. This session will explore strategies for teachers and leaders to fairly and accurately assess 21<sup>st</sup> century skills.

In this session, we will look at how the common software program Microsoft PowerPoint (and its free open-source alternative, LibreOffice Impress) can be creatively used to make gamified activities that can be used in virtual or in-person classes. Attendees will leave equipped with a variety of fun ideas (and PowerPoint game templates!) that cater to the four skills and have proven successful in motivating younger learners.

			Very Young Learners

The program *Improve Your Career Prospects* is being carried out in Serbia this academic year. The program is intended for young, unemployed adults with the aim to enhance their career prospects and develop various skills needed for their future jobs. This ESP program is delivered online via the learning platform Canvas.

As for the *English Access Microscholarship Program*, the author will present the program and talk about the pedagogical background of this learning-by-doing, project-based and inquiry-based program, the infusion of the 21st century skills into traditional learning, and other benefits for our students.

The Regional English Language Office and the U.S. Embassy in Belgrade support these programs, and the author intends to talk about the benefits of the U.S. government-sponsored programs in Serbia.

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Throughout this talk/seminar, I will lay out the benefits that an Erasmus+ project can bring about for a CLIL school regarding teachers and pupils. We will look at specific examples of different CLIL schools across Europe (Spain, Italy, and Latvia) and see how the CLIL teaching practice can change for the better in terms of making staff more broad-minded. I will also bring to the fore some benefits from an intercultural and linguistic perspective and I will also look into the concept of "Culture" in CLIL and what that entails from a pedagogical point of view (Schulz 2001; Ellis 2003; Yamada 2019; Kinginger 2013). What is more, I will draw up a relationship between intercultural competence and language based on the research we have carried out during an Erasmus+ KA201 project in which Spain, Italy and Latvia participated. During this research, we got very interesting results which went to show that CLIL children's direct involvement in an Erasmus+ project can significantly increase their intercultural awareness and linguistic competence in the target language and therefore, outperform other CLIL learners who are not involved in European projects. During the development of this conference, I will put forward these results e.g., enhancement of the teaching practice, increased children's intercultural awareness, etc. and give further details about the benefits that the participation in Erasmus+ projects has for CLIL learners.

Finally, we will run through some practical ideas that you will be able to use straight away with your groups.

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It is naive to think that teaching remotely, i.e., virtually synchronously, is easier to execute, less time consuming and eco-friendlier than traditional classroom teaching. After all, no need to print and cut handouts, move chairs and tables for pair work and stick word of the day on classroom walls. Is it always so? As COVID-19 caused families, teachers and students learn and teach from home, we all came to realisation what key decisions a teacher makes that affect the whole lesson flow either fruitfully or with learning losses. This workshop will challenge you in your pedagogical knowledge in teaching English, test your technological knowledge to meet the current English language remote teaching and learning needs, and will help you design a portfolio of online ESL teachers' skills and competencies working with young learners.

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"Writing is not thinking written down after all of the thinking is completed. Writing is thinking", Donald M. Murray, a fellow writing teacher says. There has been a lot of talking lately about thinking skills, and how we need to teach those if we can. I never thought I could until I started teaching a Writing class. To me as an EFL teacher, writing was something students did as their homework, and I checked as mine. Let me give you an insight into how writing courses work, and you can think about whether your English lesson writing can/ should follow suit.

Quality language learning service holds a unique power, that of equity. Linguistic justice upholds the necessity of inclusive and egalitarian linguistic policy. The concept of linguistic justice was proposed by Pool (1991), in order to cope with the asymmetries quite often found in multilingual contexts [...]. It might feel more opportune than ever before to discuss linguistic justice, but it is a diachronic issue, dating to antediluvian times and the Tower of Babel narrative in Genesis. English has served as a Lingua Franca in the past and continues to do so nowadays, in many of the countries that were colonized by the British from the late sixteenth century on [...]. What is new about English as a Lingua Franca, however, is the extent of its reach (Jenkins, 2013).

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"We've always done it that way" is not good enough anymore. To be successful in our work as educators, today we need to not only agile and flexible, but we must adopt new notions of the learning cycle. Lifelong learning is not only a concept we use to describe adults but must be a goal for our students as well. In this presentation, we will discuss how a more thorough understanding of the concept will enable us as educators to become more adept in our work with learners and effective as leaders in our field.
